A preposition + a noun = a prepositional phrase

Prepositional phrases add all kinds of information to a sentence.

Examples:

- Sue went to the store. (where)
- I watched a movie with my friends. (accompaniment)
- <u>During the movie</u>, someone was talking <u>behind me</u>. (when) (where)

Words in the prepositional phrase <u>cannot</u> be the subject or verb of the sentence.

To + a verb is <u>not</u> a prepositional phrase. It is an infinitive. It is <u>not</u> the verb.

Underline the prepositional phrases.

He played in the snow without a coat.

The apartment building across the street used to be a school.

I want to play the game by myself.

We saw blackberries along the road.

After the party, we went to the Starbucks across the street.
