Discussion Strategies

Using Follow-up Questions



Sometimes when we are discussing a topic, we want to know more about the answer that the other person gives. When we want to know more, we ask follow-up questions.

By asking follow-up questions, we can...

- Keep the conversation going
- Get someone else's opinion
- Show you are interested and listening to what others are saying

We usually start a follow-up question with one of these question words:

What_____?What kind of_____?Where____?How long/far/late/big____?When?

Here is an example dialogue – **follow-up questions** are in bold and *rejoinders* are in italics:

Mary: What time did you go to bed last night?
Luis: At midnight.
Mary: *Really*? *That's late*! What were you doing until midnight?
Luis: I had a date.
Mary: *I see*. Where did you go?
Luis: We went to a party at a friend's house.

Activity: With a partner, take turns asking these questions and responding to each other using rejoinders and *several* follow-up questions.

- 1. What country would you like to visit someday?
- 2. How many members are there in your family?
- 3. Have you read any books or seen any movies lately that you could recommend to me?
